Objection Guidance for the 2025 Dorset Local Plan Consultation

How you can help (it only takes a few minutes)

1) Open the consultation or Search: "Dorset Local Plan 2025" to respond to the consultation before 13th October 2025:

2) Choose the section:

- Opportunity sites and areas for housing, employment, Gypsies and Travellers, and renewable energy
- Then select "Housing opportunity sites."
- 3) **Pick a site on the map** (Longham/Ferndown) and **add your comments** using the attached guide to choose reasons you feel strongly about.
- 4) Repeat for other sites you want to comment on (go back to the map and select another).

Tips for a strong objection

- Write in your own words, use the below bullets as a guide.
- Be specific: name places, dates and times (e.g., bats along Ham Lane at 21:10 on 12 Aug).
- Add short evidence if possible: flooding photos, queue times, wildlife sightings (bats, dormice, badgers).
- Explain how it affects you: safety walking/cycling, GP/school access, delays, light or noise at night.
- Keep it polite, factual and numbered. One or two lines per point is fine.

Pick objections from the categories below:

Green Belt and settlement pattern

- Allocations here would reduce Green Belt openness and risk merging settlements; this conflicts with Green Belt purposes.
- Exceptional circumstances to release Green Belt are not shown; the plan should consider brownfield and less constrained alternatives first.

Heathland and Habitats Regulations

• Exclude any land within 400 m of protected heathland at plan stage.

- Between 400 m and 5 km, the plan should secure a deliverable mitigation route (e.g., SANG/SAMM) for the whole housing number.
- More people and lighting next to heathland increase disturbance and fire risk; keep dark corridors.

Longham Lakes and water

- Longham Lakes are public water-supply reservoirs and sensitive wildlife habitat, not a general leisure park.
- More housing would increase pressure and affect water quality; protect the lakes' function and wildlife value.
- Evidence of water-supply headroom and drought resilience for the full plan period is needed.

Flood risk and drainage

- Some land and access routes are affected by River Stour flooding and surface water after heavy rain.
- At plan stage, steer allocations away from Flood Zones 2/3 unless robustly justified; detailed drainage comes later.

Transport and active travel

- Longham roundabouts and the A348 already suffer peak congestion and queuing.
- The plan should include a proportionate transport evidence base and a funded, time-bound improvement programme to show impacts will not be severe.
- Walking and cycling networks are incomplete; bus improvements are not secured.

Wildlife, trees and corridors

- Hedgerows, mature trees and dark routes support bats, dormice and badgers; lighting and fencing would break these
 routes.
- Loss of wildlife habitat and long-established hedgerows would reduce local biodiversity.
- Light at night also affects birds, especially during migration.

Heritage and landscape


- Development would harm the setting of Dudsbury Camp (Scheduled Monument) and Longham House (Grade II).
- Large estates would erode the village character and key views; public benefits do not outweigh this harm.


Equestrian and rural economy


Loss of equestrian facilities and grazing land removes valued local facilities and rural employment without replacement.


Planning logic and cumulative effects


- Some parcels labelled edge-of-town do not adjoin the built-up area; they are open countryside.
- Cross-boundary impacts with Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole are not resolved.
- A credible, funded route to nutrient neutrality for Poole Harbour is not clearly set out.
- Minerals safeguarding is not addressed at principle level (risk of sterilising sand and gravel).
